When you walk into the lobby of the Toledo Renaissance Hotel, you'll probably notice a Jeep in the lobby. It doesn't really fit the sleek and shiny decor, but it's a testament to the history of the city. Jeeps made for civilian use were first made in Toledo in 1945, and Jeeps are still manufactured in Toledo today.



Next to the elevators, where you'll probably spend a good amount of time waiting your turn, you'll see the sculpture pictured to the left. It seems to be made from Jeep engine parts that have been disassembled and organized. I like how the pieces have been arranged like a puzzle, stacked and fitted, all in their place. It looks clean and neat, especially with the white coat of paint.

Of course, it doesn't function according to its original purpose. Carburetors and fans and pipes are meant to be connected and busy. Oil and dirt show there's work being done, purposes accomplished.

You know where I'm going with this right? In the same way that I love the order and cleanliness of this piece, I find myself longing for this kind of neatness and order in my own life. I would like my walk with God through the days of my life to hum quietly along—family and friends, work and leisure, service and hospitality, meal plans and oil changes and walks with the dogs—a picture of beauty and simplicity.

I long for the pieces to fit together in horizontal and vertical order without excess clutter.

Instead, my world rattles and shakes and is filled with dirt and dust and pieces that grind against one another. Much like the Psalm that Carey mentioned above.

Psalm 46 is filled word pictures of complete chaos—mountains falling into the sea, crashing waves and earthquakes, kingdoms and nations rising and falling. Verse 10, "Cease striving and know that I am God," or "Be still," doesn't come from a tranquil setting.

The challenge is not to make our world peaceful and still. It's to stop striving. It's to know that He is God. It's to know and trust that He is at work in the dirt and dust and grind. To know that the Kingdom is growing and expanding like a mustard seed, in ways that are seen and unseen as we are faithful to our calling as his people.

I still love the sculpture though. A dirty old engine wouldn't be as classy next to the elevators.
